British Bengali Vocalist and Composer, BISHI's writing style was built around experimentation and improvisation of her own 4 octave vocal range, inspired by plaintive chant, pastoral folk, Meredith Monk, Bulgarian music and Indian Classical music.

Celestial Voices {Swargiya Awaz}, is an evening comprising BISHI's solo material for voice and electric sitar from her most recent album 'Let My Country Awake,' focused on dual identities, anti-racism, and a call to find empathy in a divided world  $[\star\star\star\star\star$  - The New Internationalist] Including choral pieces arranged especially for the UK's first professional trans+ choir, Trans Voices, who will join BISHI on stage.

The evening culminates in the world premiere of 'Of Herculine,' a new choral piece inspired by the life of Herculine Barbin, whose birth date globally marks Intersex Day of Remembrance highlighting the violence inherent in the binary sex and gender system. This piece was composed by BISHI exclusively for Trans Voices' uniquely non-traditional singers.

Expect a joyful but revenant celebration of the exquisitely diverse qualities of human voice, challenging all limitations.

## Biographies

#### **BISHI Bio:**

BISHI is an artist, composer and producer born in London of Bengali heritage. She has independently released three albums and several EPs to critical acclaim. Featuring revolutionary use of her trademark electric sitar and four-octave vocal range, latest album 'Let My Country Awake' focuses on dual identities, anti-racism, and a call to find empathy in a divided world ★★★★★ - The New Internationalist "Bishi is Art" - Miranda Sawyer

BISHI is celebrated for the use of ground breaking technology in her live performances, from interactive bodysuits to live coded and mixed reality environments. Collaborations and commissions include: Tony Visconti, Sean Ono Lennon, Jarvis Cocker, The London Symphony Orchestra, Yoko Ono's Meltdown and fashion designer Manish Arora. Alongside her compositions placed in both film and TV, BISHI's first full score for film (VR) premieres in 2023. Recent partners include LANDR, Real World Studios, Spitfire Audio, Spitalfields Music, Ableton and Delic. Her first AV installation 'Reflektions,' has been shown nationally and internationally, selling out at Coventry City of Culture and in 2022 became the first artist's work to be project-mapped across UNESCO World Heritage sites, The Queen's House & Royal Naval College, London.

A passionate advocate for inclusivity & the gender equality, BISHI founded WITCiH (Women in Tech Creative Industries Hub), a non-profit organisation supporting women, trans and non-binary creative practitioners in tech. Platforming music creators since its inception in 2016, with salons and live events featuring diverse guests including: Imogen Heap, Ana Matronic and Mira Calix. During lockdown BISHI curated 'WITCiH Digital Festival' 2021 starring Laurie Anderson, Hannah Peel alongside the Creative Women In Tech podcast. BISHI has been a broadcaster on BBC Radio 4 and is an ambassador for the Featured Artists Coalition and The Creative Passport. She is also on the board of directors for The F-List for Music and a Keychange Innovator (2022).

#### **Trans Voices Bio:**

The vocal collective launched in 2022 with 'Reclaim' - a Guardian Films documentary with Arts Council support, which is centred around trans joy in the context of the choir's formation and debut project at Union Chapel, London. The film saw its premiere screening at a sold out Rio Cinema, London show featuring author Shon Faye.

Affiliated with world-leading alternative choir London Contemporary Voices, Trans Voices is a diverse group of over 20 trans+ vocalists co-founded by ILĀ (fka Anil Sebastian) and Coda Nicolaeff. More than a choir, the sound of this bold new community is utterly distinctive - from hypnotic meditative pieces like 'Allow' to the raw call to action of 'Reclaim'.

Trans Voices made its first recording appearance on acclaimed violinist and broadcaster Anna Phoebe's live album Sea Souls. Championed by Mary Ann Hobbs at BBC 6 Music, the choir was asked to create a bespoke jingle for the stations Loud and Proud campaign.

The vocal collective followed this up with performances at the Roundhouse, London as part of the venue's Beyond+Between summer programme running alongside Jean Paul Gaultier's Fashion Freak Show.

Over the course of 2022, the vocal collective has appeared as part of Camden Roundhouse's Beyond & Between programme alongside Jean Paul Gaultier's Fashion Freak Show as well at Whitechapel Gallery, Pink News Awards 2022 and more.

"As the first professional trans+ choir in the UK, we are here to reclaim the spaces transgender voices are seldom heard in. We are telling our own stories, in our own ways - and it's liberating.

## Introduction from Nabihah Iqbal Come closer. A little nearer. Gather 'round.


